Here is the lowdown on the Black Beauty mystery: Dean Jeffries (not George Barris) built two Black Beauties in 1966 for the TV series. In the late '70s, Jeffries sold one of the cars to Barris. Jeffries kept the other car, and still has it to this day.

Barris then made a copy of his car (a bad one at that) and toured it for a few years. Then, Barris sold the original to the car museum in Chicago that was mentioned in THE HORNET #2. The copy was sold in an auction in 1983 to Walsh Trucking in North Bergen, New Jersey.

A few years ago, the car museum in Chicago went out of business, and a local doctor bought the car. After a couple of years sitting in a barn, it was bought by Vintage Motorcars Showplace in Cleveland, Ohio.

Before being sold to the woman in Michigan mentioned in issue 5, it was on display in March of 1991 at the Chicago Hero Con with guests Van Williams and Wende Wagner, the stars of the TV series.

As for the fake Black Beauty in New Jersey, after sitting for a few years, it was taken to a local body and paint shop for restoration. While there, the owner of the shop made his own copy from the copy. This copy of the copy has been displayed at a couple of conventions, at which Van Williams was a guest.

I hope this clears up all the Black Beauty questions out there. I think the fans deserve to know.
